CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocate. We provide volunteer advocacy, within the court system and the community, on behalf of children in the foster care system who have experienced abuse and neglect.

Our goals

We provide long-term, highly-trained advocates to children who have experienced abuse and neglect.

Educate & Advocate

Volunteers receive extensive training on trauma, child development, child welfare, advocacy, diversity, equity, inclusion, and the court system. When a CASA volunteer is appointed to a case, they are responsible for learning about a child or sibling group. CASA volunteers review records, interview parents and talk to teachers, neighbors, and most importantly - listen to the child. They work alongside attorneys and social workers as appointed officers of the court. They represent a holistic approach to child welfare.


